n behalf of the Union Square Alliance and our Board of Directors, we present this Annual Report to Alliance members and a diverse range of stakeholders who share a deep affection for Union Square and recognize its significance for our City and beyond. Within this report, we showcase key achievements, outline our planned future endeavors, and provide an overview of our financial performance from July '22 to June '23.

As we assess the potential of Union Square, we do so with realism, acknowledging current challenges, but also with a deep appreciation of the undeniable strength, richness, and creativity of our community members who persevere. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the businesses that continue to keep their roots firmly planted here and remain open, in their commitment to Union Square, despite challenges times.

Over the past year and into the future, we remain dedicated to our Strategic Plan. This plan centers on a myriad of ambitious goals, including fostering a safe and welcoming environment, bolstering our economy, nurturing an authentic atmosphere, enhancing the iconic plaza, and embracing intimate spaces, and ensuring the continued health of our organization.

In 2023, we forged strategic partnerships with the city. Mayor London N. Breed, Board of Supervisors President, Aaron Peskin, SFMTA, and the Union Square Alliance proposed revitalizing Powell Street. This plan encompasses capital investments in the promenade, benefitting the Gateway to the City and our economic recovery.

Also spearheaded this year by Mayor Breed, Supervisor's President Aaron Peskin, The Planning Department, and the Union Square Alliance, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors unanimously passed legislation offering property owners in the greater Union Square neighborhood increased flexibility in planning and addressing vacancies. The legislation removes limitations related to multi-floor retail spaces, easing zoning regulations for entertainment options and commercial building conversions.

In these unprecedented times, we're united in facing uncertainty with optimism. Union Square is thriving, welcoming new luxury watch brands, Cuyana's return, and exciting additions like Convene, Ikea, Chotto Matte, Felix SF (a hidden speakeasy in Bodega SF), and Corzetti by Adriano Paganini inside Hotel G. Lori's Diner and the Bistro at One65 have also reopened, adding to the area's charm. We're thrilled to introduce renowned luxury brands like Rolex, Patek Philippe, Breitling, Chanel, Bottega Veneta, and YSL, all showing confidence in Union Square. We celebrate historic landmarks like the cable car and John's Grill, each with a century-long legacy. Stay tuned for Rec & Park's Union Square Plaza cafe proposal winner announcement. The green shoots are already emerging.

Our efforts have increased pedestrian count in Union Square by over 28% in the past year. Preserving Union Square's essence while adapting to current needs remains our objective. Together, we shall overcome hurdles and chart a path to reimagined success. Thank you for your ongoing support.



Cleaning & Safety Services









Services RFP

Earlier this year, the Alliance issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for its core cleaning and safety services as well as security services. Our current contractors, Block by Block and Legion, have been under contract for a number of years, and although we have been happy with their service, we believe best practices are to issue an RFP every few years to see what is offered in the marketplace.

The Alliance formed a selection committee comprised of staff, Board members and other Alliance members who frequently benefit from our clean and safe services. The committee reviewed a total of 8 proposals and decided to interview a short list of four candidates. In the end, after the interviews, scoring and deliberations, the committee recommended accepting the proposals from Block by Block and Legion to continue their work with us. This recommendation was endorsed by the Alliance Services and Public Safety Committee and approved by the Alliance Board of Directors. We are excited to

continue working with these two fine organizations.

Electric GEM Car and Vehicle Branding

The GEM car is an electric vehicle outfitted with a pressure washing unit. It is ideal for daytime and spot pressure washing as it is small enough to park and maneuver where our larger vehicles cannot. With the GEM car, we are able to provide pressure washing of hot spots during day and evening hours. Additionally, the new vehicles and gators have been wrapped in Alliance branding allowing to build greater awareness of the services we provide.

Third Party Event Support at Union Square Plaza

Our Ambassadors supported several important events by setting up barricades, tents and providing hospitality. These events include the Union Square Summer Music Series, Holiday Ice Rink, Macy's Tree, Menorah, Taiwanese festival, American Tulip day and many more.

Additionally, 24/7 security services were provided during the Winter Wanderland holiday activation at Hallidie Plaza.

Additional Big Belly installations

Through a grant from the City of San Francisco's Office of Economic and Workforce Development, the Alliance was able to install 10 additional Big Belly units including 2 units at Union Square Plaza. There are now a total of 47 Big Belly units in the district.

Increased Security and Cameras

The Alliance increased the private security hours by adding a shift from 6am-2pm with two guards in addition to the 10B services. This ensures that there is 24/7 security in the Union Square district.

Through the generous donation by the Chris Larsen Fund, an advised fund of the Sillicon Valley Community Founation, we were able to install 45 additional security cameras in the Union Square district.


















Public Realm & Streetscapes



Union Square in Bloom

To celebrate Union Square in Bloom 2023 and with the support of a grant from the City of San Francisco's Office of Economic and Workforce Development, the Alliance purchased large, colorful, illuminated flowers and installed them in Maiden Lane, Hallidie Plaza, and on the stage at Union Square Plaza adding color, vibrancy and photo ops to the district.

In partnership with SFMTA, Clear Channel and the Recreation and Parks Department, we were also able to "bloom" two bus stops on the highly trafficked Geary bus line, the Union Square Stage and the Union Square Garage sign.

Ornament Project

During the holiday season, the Alliance partnered with seven artists and AT&T to paint eight larger-than-life ornaments which were installed along the Powell Street Promenade. These ornaments turned into a small art walk which was celebrated throughout the holiday season.

Hallidie Plaza

The Alliance continued to work with the City to clean up, refresh and activate Hallidie Plaza with a series of colorful improvements, including, lanterns, way-finding banners, a mural, café tables and seating, and landscaping maintenance.

Powell Street Promenade

The Alliance continued to maintain the Powell Street Promenade through safety repairs and landscaping maintenance. As the Mayor announced to allocate \$4 million to enhance the pedestrian experience along the first three blocks on Powell Street, the Alliance embarked on the first phase of the Powell Street Improvement Project.

Maiden Lane

We continued to beautify and activate Maiden Lane through beautification projects. During the holiday season, illuminated snowflakes were suspended from the bistro lights.

District Marketing & Events



Website Redesign

In December 2022, we launched our revamped website, with a focus on improving the consumer experience, enhancing navigation, and upgrading our business directory. Additionally, we introduced a 'Do Business Here' webpage with a Data Dashboard covering pedestrian counts, BART exits, lodging data, retail sales, office occupancy, and job projections. We also initiated a partnership with Vistity, offering captivating drone footage of the district and showcasing its points of interest.

Social Media Strategy

Through curated content, we showcase the best in shopping, dining, and entertainment around Union Square. Our consumer posts typically appear 4 to 5 times per week, featuring 100+ businesses and driving significant follower engagement. We also champion Alliance initiatives like Holidays, Bloom, and the Summer Music Series, with successful reel experiments


We launched several ad campaigns, with a specific holiday focus on bartable ads and Muni bus ads.

Music Series and the Start of SF Live

In 2022, the Alliance concluded the Summer Music Series, activating Union Square Plaza every Saturday with free, live music performances. We received a City grant of \$850,000 from the Economic Office of Workforce Development with which we hosted Union Square Bloom Summer Music Series starting in July 2023. Hosting 17 free performances every Saturday and on the 3rd Thursday. This initiative will be a collaborative effort between the Union Square Alliance, SF Recreation and Parks Department, and the Office of Economic Workforce Development. Our valued partners will include Biscuits & Blues, American Conservatory Theatre (ACT), Hawthorn, and Madrone Art Bar and more.

Union Square in Bloom

With 33 Bloom locations across
Union Square, including hotels,
restaurants, bars, retail, bus stops,
cable cars, and the Moscone Center,
we've hosted over 4.1 million visitors
since American Tulip Day on March
4, 2023. There have been more than
400 #unionsquareinbloom posts,
and our campaign has received
support from notable sponsors like
United Airlines and Macy's Union
Square. Additionally, 14 Union
Square bars have added 30 floral
cocktails to their menus.

Goat my Valentine

The "Goat My Valentine" fashion show featured stylish attire designed by Britex Fabrics, with support from the San Francisco Recreation and Parks Department. The Union Square Alliance co-organized the unique event with Adam Swig, Value

Culture and City Grazing, bringing together cultural icons and firepreventing goats in Union Square Plaza on Valentine's Day.

Winter Wanderland

From Black Friday, November 25, through Christmas Eve, December 24, Union Square Alliance, in partnership with AT&T, invited visitors to explore the first Holiday Village en route to nearby attractions such as The Safeway Holiday Ice Rink Presented by Kaiser Permanente, Macy's Great Tree, and the Bill Graham Menorah. Winter Wanderland transformed Hallidie Plaza into a festive holiday village with local, handmade gifts, holiday tree decorations, snow flurries, sweets, and warming drinks that enhance the space, along with live family-friendly entertainment like magicians and carolers.

Advocacy



Launch of Strategic Plan

In March 2023, the Alliance unveiled its 5-year strategic plan, crafted in collaboration with consultants MIG and Streetsense, charting a new course for the Union Square District. This forward-looking document aims to guide the district's evolution as a driving force for the entire city. The plan's key goals encompass fostering safety and inclusivity, fortifying the local economy, nurturing an authentic atmosphere, enhancing public spaces, and ensuring the organization's vitality.

Supplemental Budget, Supported Mayor's Funding for SFPD

In response to the looting in November 2021, an SFPD mobile command center was stationed at Union Square Plaza, and SFPD foot beat officers increased

Letters of Support

With the support of the Public Affairs Committee, the Alliance was able to support and advocate for the following projects:

- In October 2022, we supported a mixed-use redevelopment at 2 Stockton.
- We also advocated for allocating \$4 million to boost Powell Street's vitality, gaining approval from the SF Budget and Appropriations Committee and Board of Supervisors
- In March 2023, we endorsed Mayor London Breed's \$27 million budget supplement for police overtime and public safety.
- We actively backed the SFPD in securing the Organized Retail
 Theft (ORT) Prevention grant, enabling technology upgrade

Retail Safety & Economic Development Summit

At our 3rd annual summit, we focused on retail safety and downtown revitalization. Senator Scott Wiener's keynote covered media perception, supporting new businesses, transportation, affordable housing, and Union Square's role as a dynamic entertainment hub. The retail safety panel included Chief Bill Scott, DA Brooke Jenkins, and BART Deputy Chief Ja'son Scott, while Lieutenant Dean Hall was introduced as our dedicated liaison. In the economic development panel led by Aaron Peskin, we explored strategies to attract key businesses and combat negative narratives. The Mayor's office also shared plans for the 30th APEC Summit in San Francisco.

- 2. A brief description of those technologies:

Avigilon Control Center is a server-based video management system storing all data on premises within the district per usage policy. All cameras are installed on the exterior and video is recorded based on motion detection with date and time stamp for evidentiary use. Avigilon H4 and H5 cameras have high-definition resolution with day-night features, as well as privacy masking.

The purpose of the Union Square Alliance surveillance system is to assist in making the district safer for visitors, residents, and employees by providing surveillance of key public space areas in an attempt to reduce crime and criminal activity. The primary purpose of the system is to allow for after-the-fact investigation of crimes committed within the public realm or when the perpetrator has fled into the public realm.

Video Surveillance System Usage Policy & Procedures

Enacted by the Alliance Executive Committee on February 23, 2023 Effective March 1, 2023

Purpose of System

The purpose of the Union Square Alliance ("The Alliance") video surveillance system is to enhance antity for viditors, recidente, and emptyoses in the Union Square district by providing surveillance of clinical public areas, with the aim of preventing crimnal activities and reducing crimn. The primary objective of the system is to enable retrospective examination of any crimes that occur in public spaces or involve suspects who have sought refuge is such areas.

ines the general policies and procedures for usage of the system.

The Alliance Board of Directors reserves the right to modify or change these policies at any time.

Basic System Information

- A. Al present, surveillance cameras have been installed in various public areas, including sidewalks, plazas, parks, and alleys, within the Union Square Alliance district boundaries. These cameras are positioned to monitor the respective public spaces. It is possible that more cameras will be installed in other public areas within the district in the
- B. The following signage (or signage similar in nature) may be posted in or near areas that are under surveillance (with property owner approval) to inform the public that they may be recorded.

"THIS AREA MAY BE SUBJECT TO VIDEO RECORDING"

The cameras installed within The Alliance district do not have a particular focus on safeguarding private properties, nor are they placed in areas where people would reasonably

have an expectation of privacy, such as public restrooms. Additionally, The Aliance will not use covert or fake cameras. The Aliance does not record any audio, including voices or sounds.

The Alliance Security Camers Program is administered by The Alliance Member Services Dept, which operates 24 hours a sidy and 7 days a work. The program is administered by The Alliance or its agents, what his Book by Book (DED), Social and 27th Marker Services, which is Book by Book (DED). VII. Authorized System Users

- A. System Users
- System Users are defined as those individuals and groups of individuals who have been authorized to have direct or remote access to live and/or archived video footage captured by The Alliance comman. - Video surveillance and monitoring for the purposes identified in this policy will be conducted in a manner that does not violate reasonable expectation of privacy as defined by law.
- D. In line with the objective of keeping the public informed and supporting this policy's aim of minimizing criminal activities within the district, The Alliance may, at its discretion, share video recordings with relevant public safety agencies. This is intended to ensure that the policy's goals of reducing crime and criminal activity continue to be achieved.
- E. System Users, as defined in Section VII, will operate the system in a manner that relies on suspicious behavior or reports of specific incidents or threats, and not individual characteristics, including race, gender, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or disability.
- F. System Users will not seek out or continuously view private offices, living areas, private spaces, or places of public accommodation not otherwise visible without technological.
- H. All recorded and archived video images, clips, or footage, including those referenced under Sections V.D. and VI.G, are subject to all the same policies set forth under this Section IV.
- Twice a year, the Alliance will carry out an audit, in collaboration with its contractor, AVS, to examine all video menitoring operations conducted during the previous six months. The audit will assess adverance to the video retention policy, confirmity to video request perdocol and documentation, and examination of approved uses of all video/tall images that have been expected (including delatifier of expect and useramer).
- Policy for Requests for Video Surveillance, Video Footage Review, and Copies of Rev All video surveillance cameras are being recorded continuously by a digital video recording system (rivigilon Network Video Recorder (NVRN). Recorded video is used exclusively for the messigation of search; and safety-related noticeths and not for other purposes.  - A. The Allance is only required to provide recorded video to the general public if mandated by law. System Administrators possess full administrative rights in the system permitting performance of any system function including all authorized System User functions. System Administrators have access to system settings and are able to add, modify, and delete System Users. System Administrator passwords are to be kept separately from the System Users codentials.

C. Individuals Authorized to Request Technical Support

All individuals who are authorized to request technical support assistance (all System Users) must attend user training and follow standard service request protocol per terms of support.

 All System Users are to use their own personal username/password when accessing video surveillance system and it is their responsibility to protect their username/password and not to share it with other individuals.
 - The Alliance Member Services users are to login at the beginning of their monitoring session and log out at the end of the session.

Property Assessment Calculations

Property Assessment Method

The levy and collection of annual assessments upon property within the Union Square area provides the primary funding source for the improvements, maintenance, and activities carried out by the Union Square Business Improvement District DBA Union Square Alliance. Funding for the district is proportionally shared by property owners, who are self-assessed to supplement services provided by the property owners and City of San Francisco.

These annual assessments are based on the following variables:

- Linear (sidewalk) frontage
- Lot square footage
- Building square footage
- Type of land use

Each property owner's assessment is calculated according to the special benefit received from the services provided by the Union Square Alliance.

Accordingly, each property is assessed with their proportional special benefit based upon the various property characteristics and land use type compared to other properties within the district.

In addition to parcel characteristics and land use types, two zones were implemented within the boundary of the Union Square Alliance since July 2019. The following charts provide a summary of the assessment rate calculations for both **Zone 1** and **Zone 2** (see map on backside). For more information on assessment calculations, please refer to the Union Square Alliance Management Plan.


